3rd Grade MAP Test Sample Questions

Question 1: Math

The difference of the next two numbers in the pattern below –

5 , 15, 20, 30, 35, ?, ?

- a) 40
- b) 45
- c) 5
- d) 10

Answer Explanation:

The correct answer is (c).

The number series is in increasing order with difference 10 and 5 alternately)

$5+10=15$, $15+5=20$, $20+10=30$, $30+5=35$, $35+10=45$, $45+5=50$

So the difference between the last two numbers : $50-45=5$.

Question 2: Math

Jody is working on her model train. She adds 12 pieces of track. Each piece needs 7 screws to fit properly. How many screws she needs in all?

- a) 12
- b) 7
- c) 84
- d) 19

Answer Explanation:

The correct answer is (c).

Each piece needs 7 screws. There are 12 such pieces.
So, total number of screws needed – $12 * 7 = 84$ screws.

Question 3: Language Usage

Choose the **linking verb** from the given sentence.

After the rains, the sidewalk was slippery.

- a) rains
- b) the
- c) sidewalk
- d) was

Answer Explanation:

The correct answer is (d).



Linking Verb connects the **Subject** of a sentence **with a word that gives information about the subject.**

The word **'was'** connects the description **'slippery'** to the Subject **'sidewalk'**.

Question 4: Language Usage

Fill in the blank by adding a **prefix** to the underlined word to create its **opposite word**.

George wrapped John's birthday gift in a pretty blue paper.

When John _____ his gift, he was very happy.

- a) unwrapped
- b) inwrapped
- c) awrapped
- d) dewrapped

Answer Explanation:

The correct answer is (a).

Prefix is a word, letter, etc. that is placed before another word.

In English language some words can be made into their opposites by adding the prefix **'un'**.

The word **unwrapped** is the opposite of **wrapped**.

This opposite can be created by adding a prefix of **'un'** to the word wrapped.



Question 5: Reading Comprehension

Read the short story from Aesop's Fables 'The Ants and the Grasshopper' and answer the following question.

Once upon a time, there was a Grasshopper who loved to play his fiddle and dance in the summer. Meanwhile, the Ants were busy collecting grain from all over during the summer months.

The Grasshopper would often laugh at the Ants and tease them saying,



"Why are you wasting sunshine by working? Come, dance with me!"

The Ants ignored his teasing and continued to work during the bright sunny days.

The Ants shrugged their shoulders in disgust.

Answer Explanation:

The correct answer is (a).

In the given passage, the grasshopper is always having fun while the ants keep working hard. By making music therefore means having fun all the time.
